### Miriam Morrison to Retire as Director of Volunteer Services December 31

After seven years as Director of Volunteer Services, Miriam Morrison announced her retirement, effective December 31. She began her tenure here on January 15, 2007, with two full-time and two part-time staff members and 263 volunteers.

Working with Hospice of Dayton colleagues, Miriam and her staff:

- Reduced the training from 18 hours over six days, once or twice a year, to 5 hours, available one to two times a month, including a Saturday option.
- Increased positions to serve patient needs, now offering 32 positions.
- Helped design a custom Access volunteer database.
- Increased volunteer hours from 37,000 at the end of 2006 to an estimated 69,000 in 2013.
- Began the Veteran Pinning program and assisted with the American Pride program in achieving Level 4 for We Honor Veterans.
- Helped save Hospice of Dayton \$8.7 million since 2007 in support and care of patients and families.
- Began a volunteer passwordaccessible intranet to help volunteers with information.

"We have seen expediential growth in the number of volunteers; the depth of our volunteer service offerings to patients and families; and the quality of recruitment, selection, training and retention of our volunteers," said Brenda Humfleet, Chief Development Officer and Miriam's supervisor.

"Miriam's position will be replaced but Miriam's spirit of adventure; tenacity and courage to follow her convictions; organizational skills and commitment to our Mission are irreplaceable. Miriam is certainly a fine example of someone who is living a purpose-driven life. It has been my privilege and honor to serve as her supervisor." Miriam's career has included both teaching and volunteer management. She taught English, journalism, and biology in high schools in Ohio and North Carolina and taught courses at Ohio State University and Wright State University. In volunteer management she served as Director of Volunteer Services at the Girl Scouts of Buckeye Trails Council before coming to HOD.

Miriam and Jay, will be moving to York, SC, where they will have the titles of "Grammie and Grampie" and volunteer at hospice and their new church.



### Volunteer Intranet Site to Add All Volunteer Positions

During fourth quarter, Volunteer Services and Information Technology will be adding all volunteer positions to the volunteer intranet.

In July the site was launched to help volunteers with their service. The pilot group included ambassadors and receptionists.

Currently, 47 ambassadors, 32 receptionists, and 27 visitors/ caregivers are using the passwordaccessible site to receive the latest information on their positions, monthly schedules, announcements, news, and continuing education through articles.

In September, direct patient care volunteers, visitors and caregivers, and Heirlooms and Heartfelt Gift volunteers were invited to register for the site.

By the end of the year, all volunteers will have access the site when the sections are completed for musicians, animal-assisted therapy teams, office assistants, hospice house assistants, celebrating life story assistants, QOL assistants, veteran pinning assistants, drivers, chaplains, fundraising, and Gifts from Loving Hands.

Volunteers will receive an invitation to register as their section is launched.

### **Director's Discussion**

### Lights of Love, Caring Compassion Touch Lives

As we approach the holidays, there will be dazzling lights that highlight the Hospice Houses. Lights will adorn trees, and candles will be in windows and on Advent wreaths.

When I spent a summer working in Boston, I saw several candle-making shops. When I saw a hand-dipped candle being made, I realized that a candle is made of ordinary items of a bit of string and hot wax. It is dipped and dipped in hot

wax with a patient hand. It gathers wax upon the strand until completed and then lighted to give a glowing light.

Life is much like that bit of string. Day by day, year by year, we work with hands and hearts on life's strand. Like the candle gathering wax on a strand, our lives gather joy, making our dark days bright and giving us a glowing warmth to endure the "coldness" that comes at times.

I've been reminiscing about the past seven years as your Director of

Volunteer Services. You have brought me much joy with your service. I am amazed that by the end of 2013, we will be at almost 900 volunteers. Volunteers have lit their small candles and shed much light on lives, making the difference between a dark day and one the glows with caring, compassion.

Our hospice family has been so special to me. You've rejoiced with me on the births of our five grandchildren in York, SC, and Chicago and comforted me in the deaths of my parents. You've said "yes" many times to fill requests and made me so proud to work with you. Like a family, we've broken bread together at recognition banquets, Oktoberfest, picnics, 5K Walk lunches at our home, and holiday luncheons. You've sent me many cards and e-mails of appreciation over the years that made me feel special. Within several minutes after announcing my retirement, scores of e-mails appeared with your kind words on how I touched your lives.

You've touched my life in so many ways with your service. You've taken care of some of my dear friends during their end of life journey. Many poignant moments stand out for me. A blanket covered a friend of 30 years in her casket. The little card was still attached, "Knitted with love by Judi." At the funeral home, a veteran pinning assistant pinned a veteran in his casket, and the Hospice Veteran Partnership Pin was buried with him. Tears of pride streamed down the faces of the family members. Tears welled up in my eyes, not just for the family, but for that wonderful volunteer who honored him.

#### I leave you with this special blessing:

May your volunteering bring healing, light, and renewal to those you serve. May you be present in what you do. May the dawn of each day find you awake and alert, approaching your new day with dreams, possibilities, and promises. May evening find you fulfilled. May your soul calm, console, and renew you. May you live one day at a time and make it a masterpiece.

### Author Will Schwalbe Speaks at Victoria

Volunteers are invited to hear best–selling author Will Schwalbe on Monday, October 28, at 7 p.m. at the Victoria Theater. The presentation is free as a gift to the community from Hospice of Dayton in appreciation for their support of local hospice services.

Schwalbe is the author of *The End* of Your Life Book Club, based on the experience he shared with his mother during her treatment for cancer. Mary Anne Schwalbe and her son spent many hours sitting in waiting rooms together. To pass the time, they would talk about the books they were reading. Once, by chance, they read the same book at the same time—and an informal book club of two was born.



Through their wide-ranging reading, Will and Mary Anne—and those who join their journey by reading the book —are reminded how books can be comforting, astonishing, and illuminating, changing the way that we feel about and interact with the world around us.

A profoundly moving memoir of caregiving, mourning, and love— *The End of Your Life Book Club* is also about the joy of reading, and the ways that joy is multiplied when we share it with others.

Will Schwalbe has worked in publishing, most recently as senior vice-president and editor-in-chief of Hyperion Books; news media, as founder of <u>Cookstr.com</u>; and as a journalist. He serves on the board of the Kingsborough Community College Foundation. He is the author with David Shipley of *Send: Why People Email So Badly and How to Do It Better.* His most recent book, *The End Of Your Life Book Club*, spent twelve weeks on the *New York Times* bestseller list in hardcover and paperback. It was named an *Entertainment Weekly* Best Book of the Year, was one of Amazon's top four best books of the year, won an Indie Choice Honor Award, and was awarded the Books for A Better Life Award for Best Inspirational Memoir. It has been translated into ten languages.
